FIRST RESPONDER DISABILITY EXEMPTION FILING INSTRUCTIONS

Florida Statute 196.102 indicates the following:

"Any real estate that is owned and used as a homestead by a person who has a total and permanent disability as a result of an injury or injuries sustained in the line of duty while serving as a first responder in this state or during an operation in another state or country authorized by this state or a political subdivision of this state is exempt from taxation if the first responder is a permanent resident of this state on January 1 of the year for which the exemption is being claimed."

- First responder refers to a law enforcement officer, a correctional officer, a firefighter, an emergency medical technician, or a paramedic who is a full-time or part-time paid employee or unpaid volunteer.
- In the line of duty means arising out of and in the actual performance of duty required by employment as a first responder.

Please complete the Homestead Exemption application (<u>DR-501</u>). Be sure to sign the application on page 2 and return it to the Polk County Property Appraiser's office along with the following:

- 1. Completed Employer Certification of Injury
- 2. Accident or incident report documentation of the incident or event that caused the injury
- 3. In addition to the above forms, please complete one of the following options:
 - For Quadriplegic, Paraplegic, Hemiplegic, Legally Blind, or those who require the use of a wheel chair:
 - FL Physician's or Optometrist's Certification of Total and Permanent Disability (DR-416 or DR-416B) from TWO licensed Florida Physicians.
 - For all other total and permanent disabilities:
 - First Responder's Physician Certificate of Total & Permanent Disability certificate must be from a physician licensed in this state
 - Award letter from the Social Security Administration (SSA) must be provided within 3 months after issuance -OR- Additional physician certificate and a Document from SSA stating applicant is not eligible to receive a medical status determination
